- Create an intergenerational hub of well-being, using Blue Zones Project principles



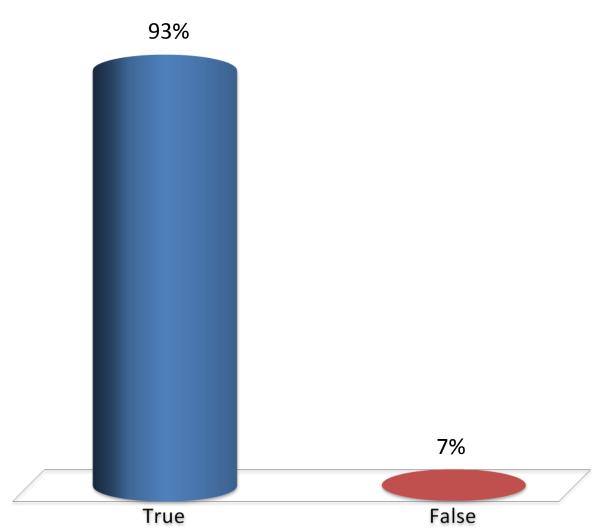

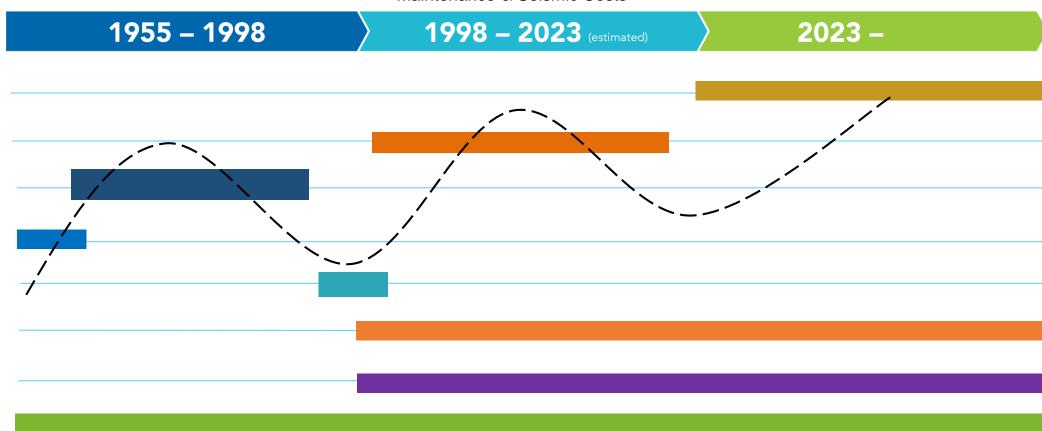

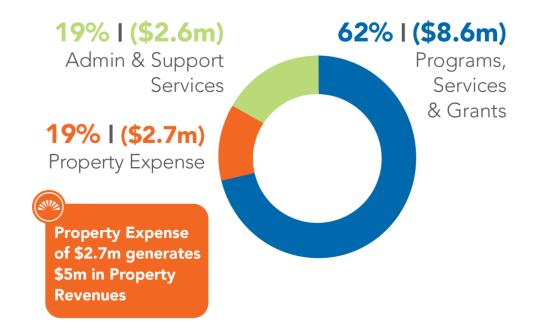

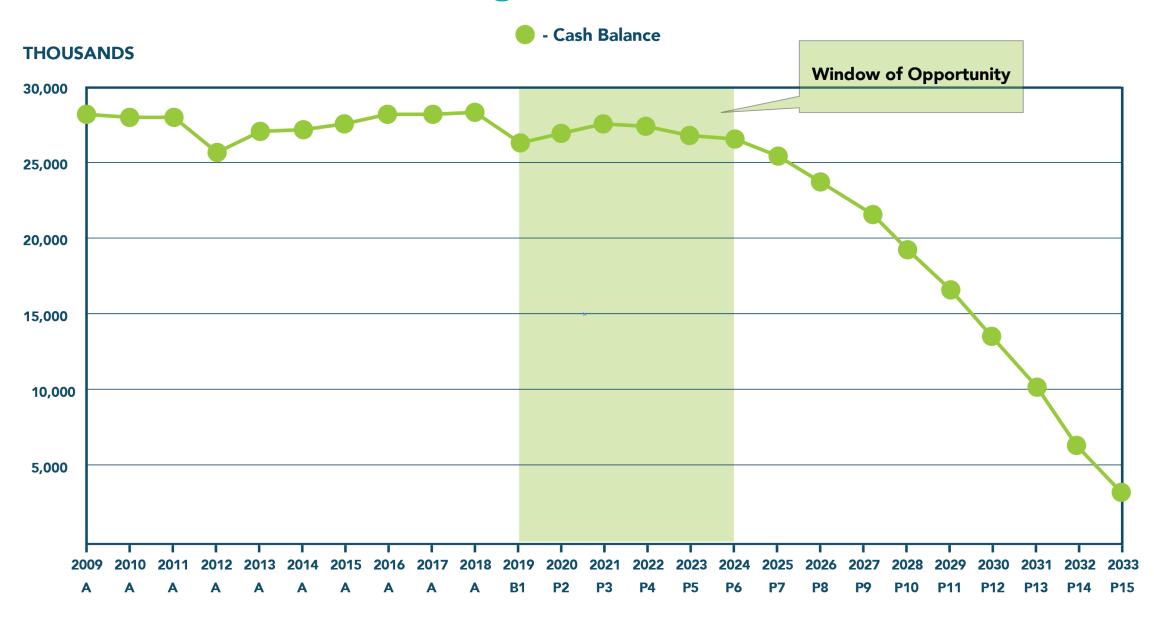
